

## A Unique Approach to Graduate Education

Hillsdale College's Van Andel Graduate School of Statesmanship looks to both the theory and practice of government. Aristotle believed that the art of the statesman was *phronesis*, or practical wisdom, which required two kinds of knowledge: knowledge of right and wrong—of what comprises justice in a political order—and knowledge of the practical—of how one's political regime works and what is possible to do given prevailing laws, customs, and opinions.

The predominant view in contemporary political science is that the first kind of knowledge is unattainable. Ethics—the study of right and wrong, of the noble and the base, and of the just end toward which politics ought to aim—is rejected as "unscientific" since it deals with mere "value judgments." At the same time, practical knowledge is reduced to nothing more than quantitative analysis, where mathematics and statistics hold at least equal importance to knowing the laws, institutions, and processes of government.

In contrast with this, the approach of the School of Statesmanship is classical. It begins with the idea that American politics should be understood in light of its first principles. That requires, first, an understanding of those principles as they were understood by America's founders. Additionally, it requires comprehending the relation of those principles to the Constitution and their fate in the development of modern American political institutions and practice.



The first principles of American politics are rooted in what Thomas Jefferson called the "elementary books of public right," the classic works of the Western tradition from Plato to John Locke. Students begin by reading these and continue by reading more modern writers such as Kant, Hegel, and Nietzsche, to understand the roots of contemporary political thought.

America's first principles are the very principles upon which Hillsdale College was founded, nearly two decades before the Civil War. These principles, and the College's commitment to them, are the reason the College exists and the reason it has served the pursuit of truth and the defense of liberty throughout its history.



## The New Saint Andrews-Hillsdale Partnership

An innovative partnership between New Saint Andrews College (NSA) and Hillsdale College opens the door for NSA graduates to pursue a Master of Arts in Politics at the Van Andel Graduate School of Statesmanship. Qualified NSA graduates can receive full-tuition scholarships (excluding student fees) to our four-semester program, designed to prepare students for work in the fields of public policy, K-12 education, journalism, law, and public service, broadly understood.

### **Eligibility Requirements:**

- NSA bachelor's degree earned within two years of matriculation to Hillsdale.
- Endorsements/Letters of Recommendation from two of the four designated NSA faculty. List available at **gradschool.hillsdale.edu/nsa**.
- All eligible students must meet admissions requirements, academic policies, and regulations set forth in the Graduate Handbook.

## **Masters Program**

### **Two Tracks**

All courses fall within one of two tracks: Political Philosophy or American Politics and Political Thought. Master's students complete a minimum of 36 credit hours overall with a minimum of 9 credit hours in each track. Although the program has core and elective courses, there are no specific required courses for the M.A. program.

### **Two Options**

Most M.A. students complete 36 hours through standard coursework and take master's comprehensive exams in their final semester of coursework. Some M.A. students seek permission to complete 30 hours through standard coursework and complete and defend an M.A. thesis, which counts as 6 credit hours.

### **Focused Study Courses**


